

PROJECT KIKS LEADS POST-EBOLA CLEAN WATER SUPPLY TO SCHOOLS

-Begins Donation Of Polytank To School

Project Kind Initiative for Kids Shoes (Project KIKS) has begun the distribution of polytanks to schools in Monrovia.

The exercise is in anticipation for the provision of clean and safe drinking water to schools to enhance learning in post-Ebola Liberia.

As an initial effort to indicate its seriousness and commitment, Project KIKS-Liberia donated a Polytank to WARD Preparatory School in the LPRC Community.

Country Director Sekou S. Dukuly who made the donation on behalf his entity

who as a result of the outbreak are finding it increasingly hard to access clean and safe drinking water on school campuses," he said. Immediately after the donation, Mr. Dukuly assigned a volunteer from Project KIKS to work with the administration of WARD Preparatory School to monitor the use of the water and report findings for further action.

He added that before the

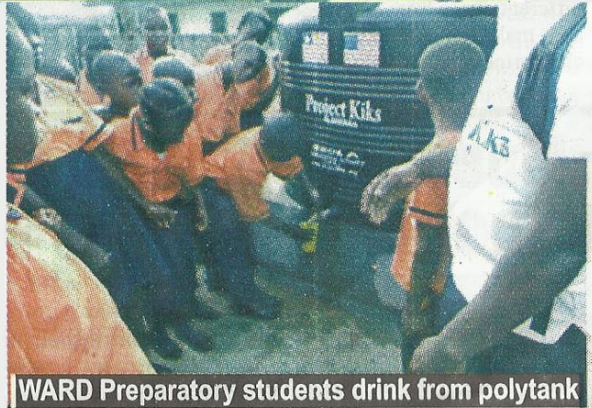
said schools in the 19 project communities already identified along the Somalia Drive in the Gardnersville suburb will each receive a 500-gallon polytank free of charge for use by both school administration and the student population.

According to him, the initiative is in response to creating safe learning environment and the ardent need to protect school going kids and teachers to continuously use the Ebola preventive measures as advised by health officials from the World Health Organization and the

outbreak, the program has been assisting kids with shoes and other basic needs to go to school.

Dukuly said, "During the Ebola outbreak that claimed the lives of many children and their families in the country we continue to provide Ebola preventive materials including food to homes of victims and orphans in 19 communities."

W. Duo, Registered Nurse and Proprietor lauded Project KIKS for the gesture and said it was surely a dream come true.

"This gesture is a complete dream comes true because we have been praying for such moment," she said with joy.

Madam Duo added that the polytank will be used for the intended purpose in meeting the need of the 450-500 students and 20 teachers who travel outside the corridor of

the school to find water to drink.

She said the school has reduced tuition by fifty percent to help parents and guardians cope with hardship brought about as a result of the Ebola virus outbreak in the country.

For his part, Principal Abeyome Duo encouraged development partners and other organization to emulate the example of Project KIKS to bring relief to Liberian students in the country.
